**ADDITIONAL NOTES:** The Norwegian family branches have a history of name changes. One of the prominent old names is Bøen (now Bøhn) which is pre-Klemmetsrud (Klemesrud). From 1862 to 1866 Knud Klemesrud lived on the Ildjarnstadhaugen farm and went by that name. In Norway, Norby was spelled Nordby. One of the Grøv family lines is about 0.0003% Scottish, not even enough to alter the numbers above. My Irish McCormick great-great-grandfather had an English mother. The Lipe branch of the family is mostly German but traces back to the Leipp family of Switzerland. Moles is a Scottish name but that clan stems from Molesworth in England. Johanna Wetzel's maiden name was Haise. She may have been unofficially adopted by the Ball family that founded the town of Ballwin, Missouri. The Ball family was Irish, but census records and her death certificate show that she was German.
